State Elections Are Over Now It's Our Turn LPBC Votes for New Board on July 10

Following our tradition of getting together outside over food to do our voting, on July 10, LPBC will have its annual BBQ at the home of Bo and Betsy Shaffer, and will then elect our Board for 2003-2004. If you have not been able to be there in past years, you've missed a lot of good conversations, and good food. Bring something to BBQ and your choice of beverage (there will be some soda pop). The BBQ and the meeting are open to the public, but voting is restricted to official "voting members" of the LPBC. For additional information and directions, contact Bo (see contact information on page 4). For those of you unfamiliar with the election process, here's some information from the LPBC By-laws:

Election of Officers of the Board

1. Officers are elected by the Voting members of the LPBC for terms of one year, beginning at the monthly Board meeting held in July and expiring at the meeting held in July of the year following.

2. Only Voting members are eligible for election as Officers. Members wishing to run for an office must advise the Publicity Director of their intention no later than the June Board meeting. The Publicity Director is responsible for creating an announcement of all candidates for each office, and submitting it to the Newsletter Editor for inclusion in the July issue of Liberty News. [editors note: newsletter deadline is 8 days after June board meeting, to be held 6/12/03] Absentee ballots will also be provided in or with the July newsletter.

3. Votes will be cast at a meeting of the membership held in the month of July. Votes may be cast in person, or by mail using the ballot provided with the July newsletter, if such ballots are signed and dated and received by the Secretary on or before the day of the July meeting.

4. Votes will be counted by the Chairman and Secretary. In the event of a tie, there shall be an immediate run-off vote between all tying candidates, with all Voting members present eligible to cast votes. This process shall be repeated as necessary until one candidate receives the highest number of votes.

5. "None of the above" (NOTA) is recognized as a legitimate candidate for any office, and if NOTA should win, the balloting must be repeated with any defeated candidates ineligible.

6. Elected candidates take office immediately.

7. No person may simultaneously hold or be a candidate for more than one office.

If you are thinking about contributing some of your time and energy to the organization, here are the job descriptions for the members of the Board:

Duties of Officers

Chairman

Take a leading role in determining the goals, direction, and plans for the LPBC; Ensure that the regular activities of the LPBC are conducted in a timely, responsible manner that brings credit to the LPBC; Chair all meetings of the Board; Prepare and submit to the Newsletter Editor a feature article for each issue reporting on recent and/or future activities of the LPBC; Prepare an agenda for Board meetings and distribute copies to all Officers; Act as a contact point for interfacing to other Libertarian Party organizations, affiliates, and political campaigns.

Secretary

Record the official minutes of all Board meetings. These minutes must be submitted for review and approval at the following month's Board meeting. A copy must also be submitted to the Newsletter Editor for summarization in the following month's issue of Liberty News; Regularly check the LPBC's Post Office Mailbox for incoming correspondence, and make any mail received available to the Board at meetings; Maintain the master copy of these By-Laws and incorporate into them any and all amendments made.

Treasurer

Keep all financial records of the LPBC according to generally accepted accounting practices; Maintain a bank account in the name of the LPBC, and sign all checks drawn upon that account;

Make monthly reports to the Board at meetings showing all incomes, expenditures, and resulting balances, including the sources of income and the nature and purpose of expenditures;

Prepare an annual written report summarizing the past twelve monthly reports, suitable for inclusion in the July issue of Liberty News; Participate in an annual audit of the financial records, to be conducted in January by at least two other Officers. The results of this audit must be communicated to the February Board meeting.

Membership Director

Take a leadership role in the task of increasing the membership of the LPBC; Maintain the membership roll of the LPBC, including members' current name, address, phone numbers, membership and dues status, and copies of the signed and dated pledges for each Voting member; Maintain a computer database of all members, prospective members, registered Libertarians, and other interested parties in Boulder County. (Information in this database is not to be released to any party outside the LPBC without the prior authorization of the Board);

Prepare and distribute in a timely manner informational packets to prospective members who have requested such information from the LPBC; Forward requests for information to other Libertarian Party organizations or affiliates where appropriate; Provide for the Newsletter Editor a membership report for inclusion in each month's newsletter, together with a complete set of mailing labels for all eligible recipients of that particular issue.

Newsletter Editor

Receive submissions from LPBC members and others for possible inclusion in the monthly publication of the LPBC, Liberty News. Serve as editor and publisher for this newsletter, in sole discretion except for the following features which are mandatory:

1. Notes from the Chairman
2. Membership report
3. Libertarian Party contact information, listing principal officers of the LPBC, LP of Colorado, and National LP
4. Calendar of upcoming events, especially Board meetings
5. Summary of Secretary's minutes from the previous Board meeting
6. Treasurer's annual report (July issue only)
7. Announcement of candidates for Officers and vote-by-mail ballot (July issue only);

Establish and implement a publication schedule for the newsletter such that each issue will typically be received not less than one week before each month's Board meeting; Sell advertising in the newsletter at rates determined by the Board, and maintain records on expiration of ads; Interface with editors of other Libertarian publications, to ensure that appropriate information and features are shared and kept current;

Keep records of costs for printing and postage for each month's issue, and submit these expenses, together with receipts, to the Treasurer.

The Treasurer is authorized to reimburse expenses related to the newsletter without prior action of the Board.

Publicity Director

Interface to the mass media regarding announcement of LPBC Outreach meetings and other events, including (but not limited to) the Boulder Daily Camera and the Colorado Daily; Devise and submit (with Board approval) any paid advertisements made by the LPBC in print, audio, video, or electronic media; Write and distribute press releases when so directed by an action of the Board; Generally promote the creation of favorable publicity for the LPBC and its activities in Boulder County.

Campaigns Director

Co-ordinate all political campaigns of the LPBC; Identify political races and ballot issues; Recruit and qualify candidates; Identify and/or assist in candidate training opportunities; Assist candidates with "paperwork" (e.g. filing and reporting requirements).

Fund-Raising Director

Initiate and operate fund-raising activities (e.g. bowl-a-thon, fund-raising letter campaigns); Report income and expenses to the Board.

Outreach Director

Lead outreach efforts to expand LPBC awareness and help grow membership; Identify suitable outreach events (e.g. Boulder Creek Festival, city/county fairs, gun shows); Initiate and co-ordinate LPBC-sponsored events (e.g. guest speakers, Tax Day protests); Organize LPBC participation (e.g. register for events, solicit volunteers, supervise activities); Maintain/enhance LPBC outreach materials (e.g. outreach booth and its associated supplies, brochures, banners, etc.).

If any of these job descriptions somehow seem familiar to you, or you might consider getting more information about them, or there is someone you want to nominate for a given position, just call someone on the Board. We would be happy to have a few more members taking on the day to day operations; if you see a board position already full, don't let that stop you. Those of us on the board might be happy to shift to a new (still empty) board position; then you'd have the best of both worlds, a Board position, and the previous position holder right at hand to answer questions, give tips, etc.

Anyone interested in getting on the ballot for the next election on July 10 must contact the board so their name may be placed on the ballot. Since the mail-in ballots go out with the July newsletter, the deadline is June 20, 8 days after the June board meeting.

Even if you decide not to run for anything, please join us for BBQ, and to cast your vote for the candidates of your choice. Contributing members may attend the BBQ, but may not vote.

Should you wish to become a voting member, just sign the pledge on the membership form in this issue, and send it in with a note saying you wish to change from contributing to voting status.

Directors' Reports

Chairman's Report:

Bo has been active in misc. LPBC activities. LPBC negotiating with National on trading money owed for tabloids. 30,000 tabloids probably coming. Many designated as inserts in newspapers in Libertarian leaning areas. LPBC hopes to get 5000 (free). LPBC working to get next newsletter out.

Secretary's Report: The next meeting, Thursday June 12th, will be at the Longmont library at 7:00PM. Paul Tiger has suggested Café Luna as a meeting place; we will consider.

Treasurer's Report:

\$189 total. Greg has submitted the FCPA forms.

Publicity Director: No director, no report.

Fund Raising Director: No director, no report.

Newsletter Editor:

Eva submitted a printed newsletter report detailing printing and distribution. 80 copies printed, 60 sent out, extras available for distribution.

Outreach Director: No director, no report.

Campaigns:

Eva will contact Nancy Jo Wurl to find out what offices will be opening for elections this Fall. Eva would like to use the booth at the Louisville Fair for campaigning, but can't man it until August.

Membership Director:

All booth materials and content are to be subject to Board approval. Email vote approved if issues arise.

Government as a Growth Industry Paul Tiger

Private industry and commercial ventures that survive economic fluctuations, without downsizing or cut-backs in

operations are not that common. Private interests that grow in facility size, staffing, and cash flow during economic downturns are even harder to find. That is, unless they serve the government. Or are the government.

The federal government has been growing exponentially since the end of the nineteenth century. During the Roosevelt administration, the executive branch of government began to overshadow the other two branches in size, funding, and force of will. This has become the modis operandi of what most people term as the federal government. The growth and tyranny stems from the executive branch. In many cases, departments created by the executive branch are contrary in their operations to our constitution, and in direct conflict with the other two branches.

While we Libertarians all agree that this is out-of-balance, most Americans don't understand the implications that this has on their liberties. However, many do see the effects of gross mismanagement of a business in a model that does not work. But it continues to grow.

Industrial and commercial ventures that succeed do so because they provide a wanted need or service. They are sparked, and sometimes artificially supported by funding. If they continue to fail to perform, the venture capitalists or stockholders remove funding support. Quite simply put, firms that cannot remain competitive go out of business. Unless the firm is the US government. Here the model does not apply, because unneeded and unwanted services continue to receive funding and staffing from the stockholders (you and I). Here your funding is invested in directions that you are not interested in.

One of the largest sectors of growth in the executive branch is law enforcement. Since the creation of the Secret Service in 1865, and its reassignment to the executive office in 1902 after McKinley's assassination, this branch began down a path of having its own security and law enforcement group. Protecting the President isn't that bad of an idea, but this has expanded to include visiting heads of state, running the White House police force, and having oversight of the DC police. Let's not forget that the SS are also treasury cops also. Of course this is just the tip of the iceberg, as we all well know.

The image is given that more police give more security. When they do not, fear is promoted so that the stockholders will financially support additional security resources. And we do. The bogus marketing of the government and poor investment decisions of the stockholders have been in this downward spiral for over a hundred years. The congress is also involved in supporting the executive branch's federal law enforcement conglomerate with laws so specific as to tie the hands of the judiciary. We are not just talking about the loss of liberties, but the propagation of a failed system and poor business model. Trillions of dollars wasted over a century on

a system that only promotes that which it was supposedly designed to suppress: fear and tyranny.

Those that work within the government, and many private businesses that support it, operate under a very strange model. The profit and loss sheet does it backward. In order for a governmental department to expect to continue to receive funding, they need to show that the funding that they have now is insufficient. So they spend more than they have. In the free-market world this would be the sign of a failure and investors would shy away. The quality of services rendered to the customers are not of interest to the government if they know that they are the sole source. It is to their advantage to suppress competition to their services. It is not too difficult for the executive branch to control the free market for services in the US that compete with the government. It has the largest police force in the world at its beck and call. We continue to hear threats of fear from a lack of a response to terrorism from an underfunded police force, and many are only too happy to pay for security. But we are paying a security firm that has continued to fail at its job, or show a poor services to cost ratio for a century. Push all the Loss of Liberty and Tyranny issues aside and think just about who is being paid to do the work. The bankrupt, failed model, poor performance, "can't follow the rules" people.

National law enforcement was used as a model for this growth industry topic because it illustrates the failure to provide all of the factors that could or would promote business growth in a free market economy.

Those that are charged with enforcing a few sane number of laws and the constitution of this land should be well paid for it. They should be adults also. This is not an entry-level position for teens. I would consider that the state or federal governments should only be involved in capital crimes. This leaves the work of crime fighting at the local level. Organized crime exists because of federal prohibitions. Remove them and organized crime either fails, or becomes legitimate business. The first protective services company on my list would be my local police department. Unbound by having to follow mandates of outsiders, they can do well to concentrate on apprehending violent criminals and protecting the citizens. Most federally mandated crimes could very well be pursued by private firms and civil action. This would give a balance back to the judiciary to decide whether many of these laws stand the test of constitutionality. While they have this power now, they tend not to use it, because they fear the repercussions fomented by the executive office's marketing campaigns. They are only humans.

The entire judicial system that we know of today could work much better and less expensively in a free market model. Only those that need to be involved in the 'system' need to pay for it. In and of itself it would become a growth industry, but not tax supported, so we would see much more competition in law firms. And many more attorneys would

become well versed in constitutional law to defend or prosecute their cases. As the judiciary responds to tyrannical law, many offenses would have to be at odds with base principles of our constitution, rather than arbitrary mandates and bogus legislation.

Using the example of law enforcement, it gets its real power from us via the Congress. We Libertarians are most often thinking about this as an issue with the legislation of Liberty limited laws, but the real issue is with funding. We need to stop investing in this failed service, as we need to stop funding all other governmental services that are not competitive. Finding alternative vendors is not necessary for a large percentage of the services that are now being rendered, so there will be an immense cost savings to the investor (taxpayer).

The key is not the legislation of the poor laws so much as it is the laws that govern the appropriations. If funding is not appropriated, the services cannot exist. It would be naïve to think that members of congress would not attempt to fund legislation though 'pork barrel politics' in amendments to non-related items. However, this method of squelching services and projects has worked in the past. A fine example is that the FCC lost almost

all of its funding to police the airwaves in the mid-seventies. This put many unlicensed stations on the air, and kicked off many now popular commercial and PBS radio stations. The prohibitions to using the radio spectrum are still in place, and civil cases have ensued, but the FCC policing responsibilities have been in a reactive mode for the past thirty years.

Seek out information on the investments opportunities in your government. Tell your representatives where you think your money ought to go. Or not go. If you are required to invest in America - be responsible about it.

Now it is your turn to think through the applications of this example. You have a notion of some free market answer to the oppression of the federal government. I know you do. Let's hear it.
